### District & School Profile

The Southern Kern Unified School District is comprised of two elementary schools, a middle school, a high school, an independent study school, and a continuation high school.

Abraham Lincoln Independent Study serves student in grades 4 - 12. Our independent study program is designed for students whose families have chosen independent study rather than a traditional school setting. When a student chooses independent study, the student takes on more responsibility, needs to be self-directed and disciplined to complete all assignments and attend regular meetings with teachers. Parents need to make the commitment to become more involved than they may have found necessary in the traditional setting

Abraham Lincoln's High School students graduation requirements, 230, are the same as those of the comprehensive high school.

During the 2017-2018 school year, on average 127 students were enrolled in grades fourth through twelve.

## About the SARC

**Quality, Currency, Availability of Textbooks and Instructional Materials (School Year 2018-19)**

Southern Kern Unified School District held a public hearing on October 3, 2018, and determined that each school within the district had sufficient and good quality textbooks, instructional materials, or science lab equipment pursuant to the settlement of Williams vs. the State of California. All students, including English learners, are given their own individual standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials, or both, in core subjects for use in the classroom and to take home. Textbooks and supplementary materials are adopted according to a cycle developed by the California Department of Education, making the textbooks used in the school the most current available. Materials approved for use by the state are reviewed by all teachers and a recommendation is made to the School Board by a selection committee composed of teachers and administrators. All recommended materials are available for parent examination at the district office prior to adoption. ### School Safety Plan

Abraham Lincoln's Comprehensive School Site Safety Plan was last revised in August 2017, and reviewed September 2018, by school administrators and staff representatives, to ensure the protection of students and staff, the school and school property, and to establish a climate that is conducive to learning. All staff members and parents have access to the updated plan and staff members annually review the school site safety policies. Southern Kern Unified School District has established Standards of Excellence. Among these standards are: "The Southern Kern Unified School District will maintain safe, secure, and efficient campuses that promote positive attitudes, high morale, and an enriched learning/working environment" and "Facility and grounds cleanliness will meet District standards." Abraham Lincoln met these standards.

The school is in compliance with all laws, rules, and regulations pertaining to hazardous materials and state earthquake standards. Fire and earthquake drills are held once a month. In the event of an emergency, the school's Disaster Preparedness Plan has clearly defined procedures to accommodate crisis situations, and emergency supplies are available.

Students are supervised throughout the day by administrators, teachers and campus safety officers. Visitors register at the office and receive identification badges that must be displayed at all times.
